RECTOR'S LETTER



Dear Friends

For many people nowadays life is full, frantic, and lived at an extraordinary pace. And not just those with demanding jobs, young families to care for or a range of hobbies and activities.

I speak to many older people who just do not know how they ever found the time for paid employment because their lives are busier now than ever following retirement. So, we would all do well just occasionally to stop and to live the actual moment and to remember as the Bible teaches us that: *"there is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under heaven."* [Ecclesiastes 3:1] These words remind us that it is God who has appointed the times and seasons, the events of our lives, the happy and the sad, the easy and the difficult. And so, these are words that ought to bring us hope. Because they remind us that God is in control and that we therefore need to make the best of everything that is happening right now.

Sometimes we may wonder about that! Sometimes it is easy to doubt that God does have it all together when we look at what is going on in the world or when our own life seems to have descended into chaos. Sometimes it can look as though God is not doing all that well at all. But the Easter message that we have just been celebrating reminds us that God does have everything under control and that He *has* a purpose in everything that he does. Sometimes we may have a tough time understanding what that purpose is. But as the apostle Paul writes in his letter to the Romans: *"...we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose."* [Romans 8: 28]

The secret is to discover, accept and appreciate God's perfect timing and to remember too, that we live in a world of change. The evidence of change is all around us. Spring becomes summer. Summer will give way to the autumn and then autumn in its turn will give way to the winter. But in all that change we can still hold on to the knowledge that God is in control and that change may be incredibly good indeed.

Change helps us to learn and to adapt and to grow inside. And change can stretch us and challenge us by causing us to grow through the trials and tribulations of life. Change can also keep us from getting bored. Are you the same person that you were ten years ago, or five years ago, or even one year ago?

The one constant, of course, is the one who is in control of everything. God does not change. And that means that we can count on him always to be there and to do the right thing: *"He has made everything beautiful in its time. He has also set eternity in the hearts of men; yet they cannot fathom what God has done from beginning to end."* [Ecclesiastes 3:11] God has set everything for its time so we should take the time to enjoy ourselves and make the best of each event and of each season of change.

Enjoy all that you have and always hold on in trust to every moment, trusting to God who is in control. Hold on to the one who loves us and who promises that where we trust in him, he will provide for all our needs.

## **NEWS FROM SOUTH EAST ASIA**



'A and B' have had quite a busy Spring. A has started teaching again online – 2 classes with about 50-60 students each. Preparation for the classes takes time. They are also busy helping newly arrived members of their team to adjust to their new location.

B has been on a retreat to learn about the background and beliefs of the people they are reaching out to. She is also particularly happy to have been able to come alongside a couple of blind believers and a neighbour who is wheelchair bound.

Covid continues to affect all that they do and plans often need to change at short notice. Health is a constant issue for local people and when one local man got a call to say that his father had fallen sick in a forest, he had to walk 7 kilometers to a river, which he had to cross on a raft, and then walk another 3 kilometers to reach his father.

Discipleship is a challenge for new believers, who are mostly women with little or no education. Some can read, some probably can't. They have little knowledge of their own religion, much less our Scriptures. They have a lot of religious and traditional practices that are animistic in nature and their mindset is hard for outsiders to understand. They say they believe in Jesus Christ and want to follow him but how much do they understand who He is and what it means to follow Him?

A and B's children are doing well at school. Their daughter spent her Easter break with friends by the sea. Their son is still enjoying his Orientation school in Europe. He and his friends are helping out with receiving some refugees from Ukraine.

A and B are very thankful that their host country has re-opened its borders to tourists and quarantine is not required anymore. It is the same in their daughter's host country. This means that they will probably be able see their children this summer, which will bring them great joy. They very much appreciate our prayers.

## **NEWS FROM NEPAL** *(received in April)*

First of all we wish you a [belated] very, very, Happy Easter and May the Risen Christ be with you and bless you always! Also we wish you a very Happy Nepali New Year (Bikram Sambat) 2079 starts from 14th, April. We always thank God for our friends and prayer partners like you. We love to share with you here what God has done/doing in our midst in Nepal and at Aanandit Church/Charity.

I, Milan, turned 50 last month. I'm enjoying being 50! I recommend it to anyone! Praise the Lord for one more year. Hallelujah!

My wife and a team went to Morang Eastern Nepal to speak at a Women's conference in March. There has been a series of Women's and Youth events held every month at the Aanandit Church since the Covid restrictions ended. We praise God for this all.

In March we also had a one day special seminar among the Aanandit Church Pastors, Leaders and youth workers. That was a great encouragement for every one as we spent time in worship and in prayer ministry with two great speakers from the UK.



Everyone at the children's homes and at the hostel are doing very well in their studies.

We were praying for the many unemployed in our church to get jobs and around half a dozen of them got jobs. We guided them to apply to different offices and areas. Praise the Lord.

We praise God for the rapid decrease of Covid19 and that businesses are slowly moving ahead. God has given us a good number of students in our school this year so that has been a good blessing too. We are, however, facing fuel shortages and market prices are growing very high.

We are planting a church in a new place from 30th April. It will be just on the outskirts of Kathmandu. It will be the 8<sup>th</sup> Aanandit church. We have a vision to have 40 Churches by 2030 in Nepal. Lots of Easter Rallies and outdoor events are planned too.

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## **CONFLICT IN UKRAINE**

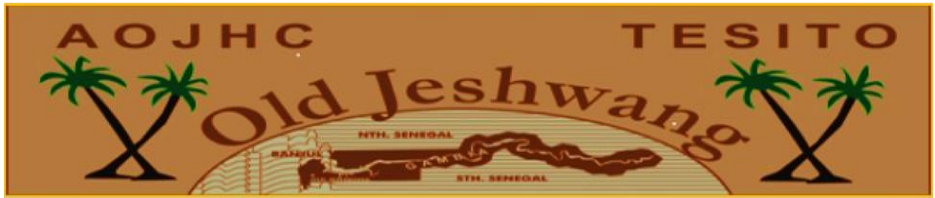
### **Thank You**

Thank you to everyone who has generously donated to the DEC Ukraine Appeal. All donations and associated gift aid will be passed on to support those affected by the conflict in Ukraine.

### **Providing Support**

A parish the size of St. Peter's is limited in what it can do on its own to help in this situation, but it can be more productive as part of a larger organisation. St. Peter's along with the Parish Council has recognised the need to support those who generously open their homes to refugees. This support could be in terms of providing transport (especially for educational or medical needs) or providing help through experience and links with other organisations. The Ardingly Support Group has been set up and registered with the Sanctuary Foundation in order to be able to draw on their help and experience in dealing with such situations. If refugees or hosts within the village need any help, then we will ensure it is there for them. It is important to recognise that hosts may also need support and access to help as refugees may be traumatised by their experiences.

In addition to providing support as needed, The Church Centre is to be made available as a meeting place for refugees to get together and to possibly hold meals and social events. Our own 'At your service' is set up and is ready to help hosts and families as required.



## **Ardingly Old Jeshwang Association**

Since the untimely death of our Chairman, Stephen Doerr, who had been key in the running of AOJA and left a huge void to fill, much has happened. His funeral at the beginning of January was a fitting tribute, with a packed Church appropriately recognising his life and many achievements. A Memorial Fund, set up in Stephen's name, has to date raised £1000 and this will be used appropriately in The Health Centre in Jeshwang Village.

Following two Trustee & Committee Meetings, Lynn Wilson has been elected Chairman and Peter Tomlin as Vice Chairman and Secretary. The Charities Commission and other appropriate authorities have been advised of these appointments.

The Gambian government accepts our facility as an integral part of its health care system and it is the permanent home of the Area Public Health Officer, overseeing immunisation and blood donation programmes. It is the intention of the Trustees and Committee to continue and build upon this good work, already long established.

Following the death of the original Administrator, Abdoulie Sowe, under the newly appointed Administrator, Chernoh Yaddeh, a new administration has been appointed. A recent report from Chernoh was very positive and highlighted the enormous amount of work and progress that has been achieved, despite the restrictions of Covid and our inability to travel out to The Gambia.

These achievements are in no small way possible due to the generosity of our 113 individual sponsors who have helped maintain our financial stability and enable The Clinic to survive, grow and develop during these very difficult times. We continue to be extremely grateful to our sponsors, particularly as fundraising has of

course been severely restricted due to Covid. We are always grateful when new sponsors join us and when current ones feel able to increase their contribution.

The following services are currently offered to the Jeshwang community by the Health Centre:

1. Maternity (mother and child health clinic).
2. Medical outpatient (Emergency consultation, diabetes and hypertension management and other).
3. Laboratory/Pathology (haematology, serological screening. Haemoglobin testing, HIV screening, malaria testing, hepatitis screening, Covid19 screening, urine testing and others).
4. Dental clinic
5. Pharmacy services
6. Birth registration
7. Vaccination (Covid19, tuberculosis, hepatitis, polio, HPV, meningitis, rotavirus etc).

This gives a flavour as to how important The Clinic is in Old Jeshwang and how your sponsorship is helping to improve the lives of thousands of people, who might not otherwise survive. It has helped in laboratory expansion and to date 25 tests are conducted as a result of the purchase of important new equipment. Maternal and child health clinics are now held daily. The establishment of the dental department has brought relief to many!

However, one of the greatest successes has been the introduction of 24 hours services. This initiative is geared towards providing accessible and continuous quality services round the clock, which enhances life expectancy and the well-being of people within the community and the surrounding areas at all times.

As you can tell from this brief account, Old Jeshwang continues to survive and expand. The initial initiative set up by the late Dr John Dale, ably supported by Margaret and continued by Stephen has gone from strength to strength and the current Committee are proud of what has been achieved, as should the Parish of St Peter's be, who have faithfully supported and prayed for it.

## FSW Update April 2022



Some good news: FSW has appointed one full time and six part time Practitioners to work in the Diocese starting in May. The new Practitioners will be working in the Deaneries of Battle and Bexhill, Cuckfield, Dallington, Horsham (x2), Hurst and Rotherfield. This now means we are active in 19 of the 21 deaneries in the Diocese. This continued growth is thanks to the hard work of many local fundraisers as well as some generous support from grant making charities. All of the posts are for a minimum of two years.

We are also in a position that we can offer support to Ukrainian refugee families as they arrive in the Diocese, should they need the help and support in settling into their new life in Sussex. If you become aware of a family needing support, please do contact Garton House to make a referral, with the family's agreement of course.

In March the 13 Practitioners were working hard by supporting 404 adults and 379 children with direct help. This was undertaken through 248 face to face visits and 534 phone calls and other electronic communications. From the food bank we made 176 deliveries of food support and our family grant scheme supported 6 families as well as a number of grants to help with fuel bills. We ran 34 support groups in the month and over 600 individuals attended at least one of them . FSW is a team and as you read this and pray for our work, you too are a part of the team that sustains us and keeps us going and we are very grateful for your constant support.

Not all of our work relates to deprivation or fuel and food poverty. Our Practitioners are very skilled with lots of experience in other areas, recently one of them supported Jack an 11 year old boy. Jack's story follows:

"Jack's mum died from cancer 8 months ago. Following her death, he moved to live with his dad in East Sussex where he has started a new school and has had to settle into a new life altogether. Jack's school asked me to offer the family some support. Jack was struggling to accept the new role his dad's partner has in their lives which was causing conflict in the family.

I met with Jack weekly in school, first building trust with him as he was very protective of his feelings about his mother. Over the next few sessions I supported Jack to explore his feelings, understand the impact of grief in his life and recognise the coping skills and support he has. At the last session Jack said he had enjoyed being able to share memories about his mum and was proud to see how well he was doing. He also said that things with his dad's partner were much better. Jack's dad sent the following text "I just wanted to say thank you for all you done for Jack, you really have helped him. Many thanks"

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A 'green' alternative to plastic

Bamboo toothbrushes are one of the oldest types of toothbrushes. The earliest toothbrushes were made in China using bamboo and other natural materials, such as using boar's hair for the bristles.



Bamboo has a smaller ecological footprint than plastic because bamboo plants grow quickly, regrowing what was taken for the production of the toothbrush. Bamboo is also biodegradable if used in its raw form, such as for toothbrush handles.

When the nylon bristles are removed, bamboo toothbrush handles can be composted, reused as garden plant markers, or put to other household uses! However, just like plastic toothbrush handles, they will take up space in a landfill if just thrown away.

THY KINGDOM COME **26th May – 5th June 2022**

This year sees the 7th annual *Thy Kingdom Come* – a global ecumenical prayer for evangelisation, initiated by the Archbishops of Canterbury and York.



“Beginning on Ascension Day and continuing until Pentecost Sunday, Christians around the globe, from all denominations, are invited to hold as a focus for their prayers a desire for a fresh outpouring of the Holy Spirit – upon them, their friends and the church. The Holy Spirit is God's promised presence with us, enabling us to be witnesses ourselves of the heavenly Father's revolutionary love for us in Christ first-hand, and then be witnesses to Jesus to the world. The prayer is simply,

"Come Holy Spirit"

And the promise is sure: *'So I say to you, ask, and it will be given to you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened for you. For everyone who asks receives, and everyone who searches finds, and for everyone who knocks, the door will be opened. Is there anyone among you who, if your child asks for a fish, will give a snake instead of a fish? Or if the child asks for an egg, will give a scorpion? If you then, who are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will the heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to those who ask Him!' [Luke 11:9-13]"*

Bellringing at St. Peter's

The art of church bellringing has been part of our heritage for hundreds of years and is particularly English, although there are churches elsewhere, even overseas, with bells that are rung 'full circle' as we do.

Sussex has many towers with bells which are regularly rung to call people to worship every Sunday (and for other services, including weddings of course) and at each a band of enthusiastic ringers regularly meet, at their own and other towers, to practise and enjoy meeting other bellringers. Some towers, like ours, have six bells - others eight, ten or even twelve. Ours were re-furbished in 2008/9 and consequently are easy to ring, having been re-hung with new fittings.

St. Peter's, Ardingly really would like to attract anyone who may wish to learn this fascinating art in the service of the church. It does not require physical strength, mathematical or musical skills and is suitable for anyone aged from about 12 years and over. Once learned, bellringing is something that will stay with you (like riding a bike but without the need to dodge other traffic and don special clothing!) for ever more and you will find that you are welcome in any bell tower, anywhere in the world.

It may be, of course, that you have already learned bellringing some time ago and would like to pick it up again - you'd be more than welcome.
