RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

On 21st April 1947, that is, on her 21st birthday, the then Princess Elizabeth made what is probably one of the most famous speeches to have been made by any member of the Royal Family. In it she said: *I declare before you all that my whole life, whether it be long or short, shall be devoted to your service... But I shall not*



have strength to carry out this resolution alone unless you join in it with me, as I now invite you to do: I know that your support will be unfailingly given. God help me to make good my vow, and God bless all of you who are willing to share in it. (Princess Elizabeth, 21 April 1947).

The young princess can have had no idea then of the quite remarkable reign that lay ahead of her but throughout the seventy years of her reign so far, and as she continues to do so day by day, Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, now 96 years of age, has certainly been true to her resolve and in her tireless example of duty, loyalty, and undivided service as our queen.

To adopt the words of St. Paul to the Colossians, who can doubt that Her Majesty has done anything other than work in the way that she has 'with all her heart.' But also, that she has done so knowing, too, that it is the Lord Jesus Christ that she is serving (Col. 3: 23 - 24). To my mind Her Majesty's strength of Christian faith is apparent in those words spoken on her 21st birthday. It is apparent in the recognition of her need for God's help to do all that she had been born to do in her life – whether that life be long or short. Her words are almost a prayer in themselves and an invitation for others to join her in that prayer so that she could fulfil all that she had to do, all that she would be anointed at her Coronation to do, all that she has done which is to serve assiduously as our queen.

Clearly, prayer and the support derived from the prayers of others, have been important in sustaining Her Majesty. Which draws to mind some other words of St Paul, who in his first letter to Timothy begins by urging us to pray for everyone before specifically urging us to pray: for kings and all those in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness (1 Timothy 2: 2).

This is a reminder of the importance of prayer, that prayer is more than mere words, it is a conversation with God. So, it is a way of opening ourselves up before God, of seeking his will, his strength, his guidance, and protection. Such prayer is needed by everyone and especially by those who govern because God made government, God gives authority to rulers, God is ultimately in charge and there is a divine origin and purpose in their God given role. The importance of such prayer in Her Majesty's life was again made clear in the words she spoke as our anointed queen on the day of her coronation: When I spoke to you last... I asked you all, whatever your religion, to pray for me on the day of my Coronation - to pray that God would give me wisdom and strength to carry out the promises that I should then be making... I have been uplifted and sustained by the knowledge that your thoughts and prayers were with me. (Her Majesty the Queen, Coronation Day, 2 June 1953)

In His response to our prayers God has indeed fulfilled his purposes. Throughout her reign Her Majesty the Queen has displayed great wisdom and enormous strength in all that has been asked of her, and in her concern, care, and love for all her subjects. So, let us keep praying for her. For her health and strength; that she may enjoy all the celebrations for her jubilee; and in the words of the national anthem, that she may be 'long to reign over us.'

I close with this prayer:

O Lord, the Way, the Truth, and the Life,
We give you thanks for your servant Elizabeth our Queen.
May she ever be provided with all she may need
for her ministry among us,
strengthened to meet every demand which her office may make,
and in all things nourished by your word and example,
who with the Father and the Holy Spirit live and reign,
world without end.
Amen.

Report from the Secretary to the PCC

The Annual Parish Meeting (APM) and Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) were held on Tuesday 10 May 2022 at the Church Centre.

At The APM Nigel Cheater and John Witherington were reappointed as Church Wardens. Nigel and John were thanked for all their hard work over the past year.

The APCM was an opportunity to hear about the events of the past year, to elect PCC members and adopt the financial statements for the previous year. A summary of items arising at the meeting was as follows

- Glynis Doerr was elected to serve on the PCC, all other members are still within their 3-year term of service. There are currently 2 vacancies.
- Jane Taylor Cheater was reappointed to serve as secretary to the PCC
- The open-air services have been popular and are likely to be repeated in future especially the Remembrance Day Service and Parade and the Christingle Service.
- St. Peter's Church is part of a local group offering support to both families from Ukraine and their hosts.

With regard to finances, the following were points to note.

- The income received was higher than the previous year. This was mostly due to claims for Gift Aid relating to the previous year.
- A large legacy had been received during the year.
- A commitment had been made to pay 65% of the Parish Share due but is hoped to be able to increase this to 80% within 3 years.
- Very generous gifts had been received during the year particularly for repairs to the West Window.
- It is necessary to continue to maintain good control over expenditure especially with rising costs.

Votes of thanks and gratitude were given to John for all his hard work and dedication and in particular for the comprehensive and variety of services celebrated. Votes of thanks were also given to all those who help with the running of the Church, the Church Centre, its services and with the Church community.

NEWS FROM HEATHER JOHNSTONE (CMS)

(written in April but received only recently)

Dear friends,

In my last link letter, I wrote rather ebulliently and optimistically about the future. About the anticipated approval of my work and residence permits. Sadly, my permits are not yet approved. This time, however, it's not the government, but due to some delays encountered within the diocese which have prevented me from submitting my online application.



I did return to Tanzania at the end of January, as I anticipated, but entered on a tourist visa. Technically I am not able to work until my approvals come through, but I organised a thorough clean-up at the cafe and surrounds, and we managed to open on a few occasions as there were some visitors in town, which is not very common these days. My return coincided with visits to the area by some Norwegian friends and colleagues I hadn't seen for some time, and it was a real blessing to connect with old friends and spend some time together. We also hosted a group of 13 Norwegian students last week, which is the largest number of guests we've

had since October 2019. The ladies were thrilled to be able to welcome visitors to our little haven in Musoma again. Moreover, we are delighted that a small team of three from Go Mad are due to arrive on 1 April and stay for 10 weeks, and my Australian friends and ex-neighbours will also be visiting for 10 days over Easter. It will be great to see everyone and slowly we will be able to start operating the cafe on a more regular basis and provide employment for more of the women.

Recently, I met with Father Robert, the head of development with the Catholic Church in Mara. He had heard about the Rehema Project and the work I do, and we met to discuss the possibility of serving impoverished women collaboratively in the wider Anglican/Catholic dioceses of Mara.

In conversation after our meeting, I asked him if he knew of anywhere that served people with intellectual disabilities, as there is no government provision for such people in the region, and I had recently met two families who were struggling to look after their children at home on their own, as they didn't have the knowledge or skills to cope with their care. And so it happened that we travelled to Ikungu, some 40 minutes southwest of Musoma, along rutted dirt tracks, to meet the humble, kind-hearted, and inspirational Father Godfrey, who is also known as Father Pendo (Father Love).

He told me that at the start of his ministry 40 years ago, he felt called to action by Matthew 25:40 which says, "Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me". He said the least of the brothers and sisters of Jesus are those persons who are vulnerable. They are the socially, psychologically or economically disadvantaged, such as the sick, the poor, and people who are mentally and physically disabled.

For the last 38 years, Father Pendo has run a large, somewhat neglected and ramshackle safe house, in a very remote area, for the extremely poor and for intellectually disabled people. He "recruits" new members of his community by keeping a watchful eye out for people living on the streets, and through a network of contacts at medical facilities, for people with intellectual disabilities who have been abandoned at hospitals by their families because they can no longer cope with them.

Father Pendo is a father figure to 71 children and adults ranging from three years old to 90-something, and it was clear as we walked around the

compound and met one and all, that he has a special rapport with every single person, and they LOVE him dearly. He told me that although the church wanted him to retire soon, it was his heartfelt desire that he would be able to continue to serve there until God called him "home" and that his remains could be buried in the grounds of this project he was called to serve with love. As is always the case in Tanzania, visitors are made to feel extremely welcome – hospitality knowing no bounds – and although it was the last thing I was expecting, a celebratory meal was prepared, and excitement levels were high, because the arrival of guests means a free soda for everyone.



What a fun and heart-warming day meeting a true servant of God and his beloved family.

In closing, please remember my colleagues, CMS people in mission in Ukraine; Anya, Valery and Alison who have been sharing the love of Jesus in tense and fearful times.

UKRAINE

We have watched with disbelief the unfolding scenes of war in Ukraine as Russia invaded its territories. It seems impossible that this is happening in the 21st century. Many of us wanted to offer help and support to families displaced from Ukraine and potentially having to start new lives as refugees in different countries.

A group of like-minded people in the village met to consider what that support could look like. Some had already registered with the government's scheme to house families, others didn't feel able to do that or didn't have suitable space but still wanted to offer support. We shared views and ideas to establish what could be offered.

There are currently three families from Ukraine being hosted in the village with a further two families arriving in the near future. The three families already here have arrived fairly recently and are settling in well. Some village residents may have met family members when they attended the Ukrainian Support afternoon at Dandylion Style. The children are attending local schools and making friends - football is a universal language!

The group is continuing to develop a fact sheet designed to offer support to host families and their guests. We are ready to provide help and support and share the knowledge that we are gathering. Things like applying for financial support, registering with GPs and dentists, finding work, rules for driving licences and cars....all these and more are the issues we have already encountered and we are learning on a daily basis. If you are already hosting a family or expect to be doing so soon, please do get in touch with us so that we can help one another.




